How is performance of Iraq's higher education in comparison with MENA and the rest of the world?


World Bank (WB) Grouping of Countries



- In 1990, WB grouped countires into 8 regions on socio-economical basis:
 - Established Market Economy (EME)
 - Previous Socialist Economies (PSE)
 - Latin America & the Caribbean (LAC)
 - India
 - China
 - Middle East & North Africa (MENA)
 - Sub Saharan Africa (SSA)
 - Other Asian Islands & Countries (South Asia)

Aims




- Evaluate publications in medical sciences coming from local institutions
- by local practitioners
- published in English in international journals quoted by PubMed / Entrez
- compare results with EMC regions

Methodology



PubMed / Entrez_is the integrated, text-based search and retrieval system used at the NCBI (National Centre of Bio-technology Informatics) for the major databases.

Methodology



PubMed was searched between 20–25 Nov 2007

- General Citations: Country* NOT Country [au]
- Specific Citations: Country* AND Subject NOT Country [au]
- Modifications of above when necessary for the best results and avoid terminology mishaps and overlaps in terminologies and country names




Examples

- Iraq*NOT Iraq*[au]
- Iraq* AND paediatrics OR paediatrics NOT Iraq* [au]
- Jordan* AND Cancer OR oncology NOT Jordan* [au]
- Swed*NOT Swed*[au]
- Modification to achieve optimal/accurate data.

Results: Total Citations






Parameters used

 - Number of medical practitioners




MENA: Citations per Medical Colleges





MENA: Citations per 1000 doctors 2003-2007







What have we been doing in Iraq?

 - Obvious effect of conflict 'Crisis Notch'


Temporal Trends in numbers of citations: Arab league






Results: Trends in the Gulf - Iraq/Kuwait






MENA, Arab League and UK






Kurdish Region: All Citations




Comparison between selected fields of medical sciences

 - psychiatry obstetrics & gynaecology paediatrics


Iraq: Trends in Selected Specialities 1948-2007





Iraq: Temporal Trends 1948-2007








Jordan: Trends in Selected Specialities 1948-2007






Saudi Arabia: Selected Specialities














Egypt: Temporal Trends






Iran: Selected Specialties














Trends in ophthalmology in the Eastern Mediterranean

Ophthalmology: Temporal Trends






Iraqi Universities

- Some younger universities appears to start performing better than other.


Temporal Trends for All Universities






Temporal Trends Iraqi Universities 1963-2007





Temporal Trends: Universities Outside Baghdad 1963-2007






Results: Summary



- Numbers of publications coming from Iraqi universities by Iraqi academics/practioners are far below those from EME.
- Less emphasis on important subspecialties such as ophthalmology, psychiatry and obstetric & gynaecology - shared by all MENA countries.
- Given the opportunity, Iraqis have the potential to produce a high standard of publications.

Why MENA under performing?



- Source of the problem? Multifactor.
 - Method of teaching:
 - Family and home?
 - Schools & Universities?
- Culture of 'spoon feeding' does not encourage questioning
- Conditions of service: absence of culture of research, remunerations, facilities.
- Imbalance between nat. health and private work.

Recommendations: 1



- Important issue to be addressed.
- Emphasis is needed to promote high standard research/publications which should enhance our universities standing in the world of academia and this should be addressed in all these countries.
- This is a multi disciplinary task which requires involvement of academic institutions, authorities and academics/professionals.

Recommendations: 2




Additional measures are needed such as:

- Addressing morale amongst academics and scientists which has dropped progressively in the last 30 years through emmigration.
- The use of the available manpower from <u>diaspora</u> in a visiting or emeritus capacity.
- Twining with academic bodies abroad and increase exchange of experts, trainees and students elective.
- Tele education.
- Adequate funding.
- ?
